## FROM CHALLENGES TO CURRICULUM: WHAT WE HEARD IN AGADIR

The round table was grounded in a shared diagnosis: planning systems are under pressure, not only because cities and regions are changing faster, but because decision-making increasingly depends on data, integration, and advanced spatial capabilities.

The presentation on “Geospatial challenges of modern society” organized these pressures into four categories previously highlighted in MLUMSE WP2:

- Environmental challenges
- Socio-economic challenges
- Urban challenges
- Governance and local administration challenges

It also emphasized cross-cutting geospatial issues that affect both public institutions and universities, including:

- Data quality and accuracy and the problem of inconsistency/outdated data
- Interoperability and integration across siloed systems and formats
- Real-time processing and big geospatial data requirements
- Privacy, ethics, cybersecurity, and data sovereignty
- Accessibility/democratization of geodata and the persistent digital divide
- A widening geospatial skills gap and slow-evolving legal/governance structures

These challenges were not discussed as abstract “tech issues,” but as direct constraints on plan implementation, service delivery, risk management, and public trust.



## A SKILLS-BASED RESPONSE: URBAN POLICY, LEGISLATION & INSTITUTIONAL REFORM

A key contribution of the day was the presentation of the course concept “**Urban Policy, Legislation, and Institutional Reform**”, which frames modernization as more than technology adoption. The course targets competence development across:

- **Conceptual understanding** of governance, actors, and urban policy processes
- **Legal and institutional literacy** (laws, planning regulations, land governance frameworks, tenure, zoning, decentralization dynamics)
- **Analytical and research skills** for evaluating policy effectiveness, equity, and reform opportunities
- **Policy design and implementation**, including participatory planning and M&E frameworks aligned with SDGs and resilience agendas
- **Ethical and professional communication skills** for working across stakeholders

### MLUMSE “IDEA AND INTENTIONS”: WHERE THE PROJECT IS HEADING

The session also revisited MLUMSE’s strategic direction: strengthening partner HEIs so they can deliver **modernized education with visible societal impact**. The presentation highlighted the project’s timeline and its ambition to equip students, teachers, and professionals to respond to 21st-century pressures (urbanization, climate impacts, land pressures, and accelerated digitalization)

The proposed pathway is clear: build capacity through **new/modernized courses, training activities**, stronger **stakeholder cooperation**, and applied formats such as an **international student hackathon**, while ensuring long-term visibility through dissemination outputs.

### ROUND TABLE DISCUSSION: PRIORITIES VOICED BY STAKEHOLDERS

The moderated discussion focused on four guiding questions:

- How stakeholders see **modernization** of urban and land-use planning and management
- What the **needs for modernization** are
- Which **technologies** are necessary
- What **academia should do** to provide skilled professionals

Across the dialogue, the strongest convergence was on the need for:

- stronger **data-to-decision workflows** (reliable data, integration, and operational use),
- more applied competence in **contemporary tools and methods**, and
- graduates who can work at the intersection of **governance, technology, and implementation realities**.
